What is a Learning Disability?

A learning disability refers to a disorder, which may affect the acquisition, organization, memory, understanding or use of non-verbal information.

These disorders affect learning in individuals who demonstrate at least average abilities essential for thinking and/or reasoning.

Learning disabilities range in severity and may interfere with the acquisition and use of one or more of the following: reading, oral language, written expression and mathematics.

Learning disabilities may also involve difficulties with organizational skills, social perception and social interaction.
